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SOMETHING'S POPPING AT ST BARNABAS!

Music, mission, and the beginnings of something new.

This June. St Barnabas School will be working with the iSingPOP team to put together a concert full of music, movement, and message. For three days from Monday 16 to Wednesday 18 June — the whole school will learn a series of values-based songs that explore big themes like forgiveness. kindness. friendship, peace, and courage, These aren't hymns in traditional sense, but they carry a spiritual heartbeat — full of joy, hope, and meaning, written to stick in heads and stir hearts.

Then, on Thursday 26 June, all that learning comes to life in a concert at St Barnabas Church Families, friends, and community members will be invited in to experience the energy and heart of what the children have been working on. If you've never been to an iSingPOP concert before, it's hard to describe. It's loud. It's proud. It's full of sparkly actions and earworm choruses. But it's also serious work — planting something deep in the lives of children and in the life of a community.

This is not just a show — it's a



starting point.

In churches across the Diocese — and particularly in our local area —

iSinaPOP has become the catalyst for new relationships and new expressions of church. You mav have read about worshipping community that's growing out of Perry Wood Primary School in Ronkswood. That project is being shaped by Holy Trinity and St Matthew Church, in partnership with our own Debra, the shared children's worker across our churches. Together, they've been laying the groundwork for something rooted the school community something honest, hopeful, and hospitable. Their model isn't about big band worship elaborate programmes. It's about people of all ages comina toaether around food, story. music, and faith.

It's prompted us to ask the obvious question: could we do something similar here?

We're starting small. We're not locking ourselves into anything. But we are taking some deliberate next steps.

We've planned two Sunday afternoon sessions at St

Barnabas Church — on 6 July and 3 August. These will be relaxed, fun, and rooted in the same joyful spirit as iSingPOP, with space for families to be together, try something new, and explore faith in a way that feels natural — no expectations, no pressure, just a chance to see what fits.

We're also exploring the idea of some holiday club mornings in the final week of the summer holidays, followed by a special Sunday service on 31 August. If the energy is right, if people come, if God shows up (as God tends to do when children start singing about love)... then we may build on it in the autumn.

Our hope is that these gatherings will eventually lead to the birth of a new monthly intergenerational congregation, based at Christ Church in the Tolly Hub. We're not rushing. Right now, we're in the listening stage. The experimenting stage. The "what if?" stage.

This project is being shaped by a strong team. Kirsty, our iSingPOP leader, brings a brilliant blend of musical energy, values-based

vision, and experience of growing worshipping communities across the country. Alongside her, Debra, who works with both Perry Wood and St Barnabas, is drawing on

local relationships and a sharp understanding of what makes family ministry work here in Worcester.

If you're part of our church family — or just part of the wider community — here's how you can be involved:

- Pray. For Kirsty, Debra, the staff and children at St Barnabas School, and for all the families who might be touched by this.
- Come. The concert on 26
 June is open to all. It would be
 wonderful to have members of
 the congregation there to
 welcome families and enjoy
 the event.
- Encourage. If you know someone with children who might enjoy a Sunday afternoon gathering, mention it to them. Ask questions. Show interest.
- Wonder. What might God be up to in all this? And what part might you have to play?

This isn't a new programme. It's not a relaunch or a relabel. It's something gentler and more spacious than that.


It's a way of creating room — for families, for music, for play, for faith — and seeing what might grow.

ART & CRAFT



The two sisters decided to take the country paths and tracks to the big house at Killerton, with its parkland and gardens. The sun shone, petals scented the still air and the trees shaded. Traffic noise diminished, the songs of birds amplified.

The ladies walked in to the big hall and in to a 1920's welcome, as it seemed they'd been 'invited' to a weekend house party. The paraphernalia of cocktails laid out, the large dining room table 'set' for breakfast. A rolled up carpet in an adjoining room exposing a wooden dance floor.

The library was bathed in the most beautifully reflected polished wood light. It glowed with invitation and welcome: a baize green table with dominoes and cards, permission given to take down any book and sit in a chair.

The feel of a physical book. Textures and patterns, the colouring of illustrations, paper cover edges frayed with use. On the spines, dislocated words, to fit the small horizontal space. How were these books made? I wondered...



Our visit to Killerton prompted me to look out our mother's writing about my great grandfather Frederick. He spent his working life as a printer and bookbinder and he and his wife Amelia lived in the same house as my mother. She wrote:

'What I remember is this: Fred was employed at the Salvation Army Printing works. He could sew, bind, book or magazine sections into the "raw book".

Stipple decorate the three outer edges of the pages in various, mixed colours. Glue, and cover in papers, cardboard. end leather the outer cover of the book. Tool the leather cover in patterns (line across corners) and the letter title. author. magazine name and dates of sections on finished item. Amelia could stitch sections on to the wide linen strips in a book press - very swiftly (I have seen this). Books were repaired (re covered?) for local libraries as well.'

'In the 60's a daughter, who rather despised her working class father saw a tv programme about bookbinding. She wept to realise that, after all, her father had been a craftsman.'

MISSION FUND NEWS

The DEC brings together 15 leading charities at times of crisis overseas and Christian Aid is one of those members.

On March 28th this year, two devastating earthquakes happened within an hour of each other, which tore Myanmar apart with widespread destruction on a colossal scale. Over 3,000 lives have been lost and many more are missing or injured. The full extent of the disaster is still uncertain.

Christian Aid and other DFC partners are working tirelessly to identify the communities whose lives are now at most risk and in need of immediate help. They are providing emergency humanaid, including shelter, Itarian food, clean water, medical care psychological support to of the hundreds some of

thousands of families impacted by the disaster. Soaring temperatures and monsoon rains are making this catastrophic situation even worse. Medical centres are overwhelmed and the threat of diseases such as cholera is increasing daily.

Let's meet Tina Peach, an ecowarrior?

Q&A with Tina's tips for recycling

Tina was brought up going to church and then during her adult life she started to attend Christ Church in 1990, and St Barnabas in 2000.

Can you recall anytime that church has had the environment at it's heart?

One vicar, can't remember their name, said, 'the environment is God's work' and looking after the planet should be part of what we do, and God doesn't want us to mess it up.

And then there was Jeni, Dr Rev Jeni Parsons, who always regarded the environment as an important part of church life, especially animals including hens, hedgehogs, foxes, and dogs.

I also like to watch Songs of Praise as they often have hands on environmental things, ie community gardens.

It is good to think how small churches and bigger churches, with grave yards, can impact the environment.

What do you do to help the environment?

I don't help the economy but I do help the environment. I am not a big consumer; I wear everything I've got!

I 'make do and mend,' I follow my mum in that respect.

Have you got any examples? (Here are Tina's tips!)

- Good shoes go to charity shops.
- I give things to Marion (from Church) to take to New Hope, charity shop.
- Cans, cardboard, hard plastic, paper, glass bottles go in the green bin
- Soft plastic ie. the plastic on top of meals etc goes to Asda or the Co-op
- Foil to the Pack It In shop in town
- I refill toilet cleaner, washing up liquid at the Pack It In Shop

- I use bars of soap and not liquid soap in plastic bottles
- Clean textiles go to Dunelm Mill, there's a bin by the front door
- · Clothes to charity shops
- Old make up is taken to Boots or Super Drug
- Blister packs, after collecting them at St Barnabas I take to Boots or Super Drug for recycling
- Old, unusable clothes-I make into rags
- Used pens- I used to take to Rymans pen recycling box, but they have stopped at the moment
- Plant pots I take to the garden centre, but only if I am going there already though
- Ceramic pots-to the tip in the rubble container (used for hardcore)
- Scrap metal-to the tip or leave out for the scrap man
- · Wood to the tip
- Mobile phones- to the tip to be recycled for metals, I hardly ever change my phone though
- Food waste-I buy sensibly, so don't over buy, and use left overs in soups, casseroles, bubble and squeak, fruit gets made into crumbles or I feed the wildlife if appropriate
- Nappies-try to get family members to use reusable ones
- Out of date medicines, I take to the pharmacy, and not down the toilet as it gets into

- the water system
- Chemical waste, like bleach-luse with respect
- Spectacles- recycled at Boots
- Used batteries-take to the supermarket, they all have a used battery container
- Books to the Charity shop and I only buy from there or borrow from the library
- Videos, CDs, DVDs-Charity shop
- Used stamps- I save and give to the Donkey Sanctuary
- I use my compost bin for veg, fruit, tea bags
- My heating isn't on a timer, and I go to bed with a hot water bottle

So your black rubbish bin can't be very full?

It only has one carrier bag of rubbish in it every two weeks.

How do you shop?

I don't drive, so I shop bit by bit, or if I have a larger shop I use the bus, or an Iceland delivery

And finally?

I do really do 'household management!'
